Kathy Roe Emily Brown Phyllis Anne Copher Mattox, 68, wife of Stan R. Mattox, died Wednesday, September 12, 2018 at Bourbon Community Hospital. Born June 3, 1950 in Paris, she was the daughter of the late Marvin L. and Thelma Dean Lynam Copher. Phyllis was a 1968 graduate of Bourbon County High School and attended Anderson University in Indiana and the University of Kentucky.

She was the program coordinator for the UK College of Agriculture's Kentucky Agricultural Leadership Program (KALP) and received awards for outstanding work from the college and from UK President Capiluto. She was also successful Creative Memories consultant.

As an active member of Paris First United Methodist Church, she sang in the choir, led Sunday School classes, and created

Master Gardener Association and served as president, vice president, and program coordinator. When her children were growing up, she volunteered with Cub Scouts as a leader and trainer, and with the Paris High School Band.

Phyllis is survived by her husband, Stan Mattox; sons R. Travis (Jennifer) Mattox and Matthew Thomas (Paige) Mattox; grandchildren Clark Copher Mattox, Camryn Reese Mattox, Jesse Asher Mattox, and Matthew Tucker Mattox; brothers Daniel L. Copher and Jan Lynam Copher; sisters Ramona Katherine Copher and Jill Dean Wedding (John) England; mother-in-law Della B. Mattox; brother-in-law Gary (Karen) Mattox; and several nieces and nephews.

Steve and Will were given the opportunity to speak at her service. The news of Phyllis' passing was mourned within the international KALP network; expressions of sympathy were received from across Kentucky, the United States, and the world. We received many notes sharing stories and memories.

Brent is one of 14 members who will advise Perdue on how to uphold the rules and regulations of the Plant Variety Protection Act. In other news, Brent traveled in mid-May 2018 to Kansas to participate in three separate meetings held by the Kansas Department of Agriculture to inform farmers about growing hemp. Kansas lawmakers passed legislation this session creating a hemp research program, and many are grappling with how to begin the hemp pilot program. Brent and others on the panel answered questions posed by the more than 150 people who attended.



A few years later, Frank and his wife (Adam's great grandmother) took over the Plummers Landing location, which was started by his uncle O.L Hinton as a wagon spoke factory.





GEORGE MCCAIN




Two KALP alumni were awarded honors at the June 2018 Springfield-Washington County Chamber of Commerce Awards Banquet in June 2018.

They sell their products at their orchard and at the Elizabethtown Market on East Dixie Avenue in Elizabethtown, KY.

The Hinton's grow and sell a huge assortment of fresh fruits and vegetables, including asparagus, strawberries, peaches, tomatoes, sweet corn, beans, peppers, squash, zucchini, blackberries, watermelons and cantaloupes. In the fall, they sell their apples, pumpkins, sweet potatoes and mums. They also sell honey made by bees on their property and fresh apple cider. In addition, muffins, homemade turnovers, caramel apples, pies, fruit butters . . . the list goes on and on!

It is a poignant look at Craig and Joanna Carraway's battle against Craig's Glioblastoma brain cancer that was diagnosed in 2016. Glioblastoma is the same brain cancer that caused the much-publicized death of Arizona Senator John McCain on August 25, 2018.

Nevertheless, Craig and Joanna are going forward with their farm and family life, which includes son, Preston, and daughter, Hannah. Both children help with the farming, along with other family members and employees. They live in Murray, Kentucky on the Carraway Family Farms that Craig and Joanna bought from Craig's grandmother.

The Carraways grow tobacco, white and yellow corn, wheat and soybeans. The tobacco is processed using the method called "double cropping a barn," which means that when they take down cured tobacco to strip it, they are also housing the next round of green tobacco for firing.
